

WEEKLY LETTER FROM MONSIGNOR KEN

Have you played this game at Christmas time, with family, at work, or in an organization to which you belong? Everyone brings a gift, then each person takes a number. The first person picks a gift from the pile. After that, each has the option to either choose from the unclaimed gifts, or to steal one from one of the others who have already picked a gift. Usually, a gift can only be “stolen” two times, then it’s retired from the game.

I don’t like it! I can never bring myself to take a gift from someone else, unless they don’t want it! Plus, I feel bad if they lose a gift they wanted. Of course, it’s all in fun and people enjoy it. I guess I just take it too seriously!.

There’s another game that is often played, Secret Santa. That’s when everyone in the group picks a name at random without revealing who it is. They have to get a gift for that person, anonymously. As in the previous game, there usually is a dollar limit so that everyone stays within a certain price range. This can also be fun, but, in the end, usually the identity of the “secret” Santa is revealed!

Here’s a challenge for a real-life game. Why not be an actual Secret Santa? By this I mean, not buying a present anonymously within a certain group. Choose someone, a family member, friend, co-worker, a neighbor, or even someone you don’t really know who could use an extra blessing. Between now and the end of the Christmas Season, the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, January 11 (so you have time), and do something nice for them.
